Emerson was born in <u>Alton, Illinois</u>, a cousin of <u>Ralph Waldo Emerson</u>, and trained in the office of Jonathan Preston (1801–1888), an architect–builder in <u>Boston, Massachusetts</u>. He formed an architectural partnership with Preston (1857–1861), practiced alone for two years, then partnered with <u>Carl Fehmer</u> (1864–1873). On September 15, 1873 he married Sylvia Hathaway Watson.

He is best known for his <u>Shingle Style houses</u> and inns. He worked with fellow Boston designer <u>Frederick Law Olmsted</u> on the creation of the <u>National Zoological Park</u> in Washington, D.C., designing several of the zoo's first buildings. [1]

Emerson was a friend to the Boston painter <u>William Morris Hunt</u>, who painted a portrait of Emerson's son Ralph, shown at an exhibition of Hunt's work at the <u>Boston Museum of Fine Arts</u> in 1880.^[2] Emerson died on November 23, 1917, in Milton, Massachusetts.
